Not Flu Vaccinated Yet? Flu Vaccination Clinic Scheduled

GRAND RAPIDS – There were fewer people coming to Kent County Emergency Departments with flu-like illness last week. Still, many people have been contacting the Kent County Health Department regarding flu vaccines. To meet this demand, a flu vaccination clinic will be held next Thursday.

“Many clients have been calling us because some physicians and pharmacies no longer have shots or nasal mist in stock,” says Cathy Raevisky, Administrative Health Officer for the Kent County Health Department. “It’s not too late to get vaccinated. There are three strains of flu this year’s vaccine protects against.”

Emergency Departments (ED’s) in Kent County reported a slight decline in the percentage of visits due to flu-like illnesses last week. The week ending January 12, 2013, 11.8% of patients in ED’s were complaining of flu-like illness. The week ending January 19, 2013, 11.2% of visits were due to flu-like illness. The Kent County Health Department continues to recommend vigilance and is promoting prevention guidelines. Health officials continue to urge everyone to practice preventive measures, such as regular hand washing, to stop the spread of flu. Adults and children with the flu should stay home from school or work until they have been able to keep a normal body temperature for 24 hours, without a fever-reducing medication.

The flu vaccination clinic will be held on Thursday, January 31, 2013, from 8 a.m. until 11:30 a.m., at the main Health Department Clinic, 700 Fuller NE, in Grand Rapids. Injections (\$25 each) and nasal mist (\$32 each) will be available. Call (616) 632-7200 to make an appointment. We bill Medicaid and Medicare. We do not bill private insurance. We accept cash, check, Visa, Mastercard or Discover for payments.

The flu can cause serious complications in pregnant women, people who have weakened immune systems, in the very young and in the elderly. The single best way to protect against the flu is by getting vaccinated. Infants six months of age or younger cannot get a flu vaccine, so it is recommended that family members and people who care for them receive a vaccination.
